More affordable housing construction through municipal housing associations and cooperatives and the application of the district's right of first refusal when selling private houses.
Preservation and better maintenance of our neighbourhood and the use of “green roofs” on all public buildings.
Protection of the free cultural scene, sports facilities, clubs and off licenses.

The district office should take control of the quick creations of new daycare centers and school places in the area.
The maintenance and expansion of our district leisure activities for children and young people, road safety (traffic?) schools and environmental centers.
